Answer-Scleromyxedema

- This is morphea with an element of morphea profunda. Histologically similar changes may be seen in scleroderma, radiation damage, and end-stage Lyme borreliosis.
- Scleromyxedema would exhibit dermal fibroplasia with mucinosis
